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On reflection

Cairns represents a welcome and inviting ray of sunshine for visitors from southern parts of Australia during the middle of winter.

The Roadmarking Industry Association of Australia (RIAA) National Conference for 2024 creates a unique opportunity to enjoy and explore the many natural wonders on offer from tropical North Queensland, while furthering our professional lives with the opportunities created by the Conference.

With preparations for each RIAA National Conference, I'm always reminded what a niche and yet incredibly diverse industry that pavement marking is. Part of Conference preparation involves discussing Conference delegates and their demographic profile with stakeholders, other delegates, potential sponsors and the like.

I say we're a diverse industry, because in those discussions I emphasise, and therefore remind myself, that the cross section of delegates and members ranges from those with Masters degrees in Chemistry, to Government officials well versed in corporate speak and polite formal communications, right the way through to the "Earthy" communication style of tough self-made successful business leaders who may have finished studying relatively early, yet possessed the inherent tenacity, business skill, and determination to make themselves successful business owners and leaders.

My advice to presenters is that they find the right style to communicate effectively with all points within that spectrum, a tough challenge no doubt!

The business environment at our last Conference in 2022 was dominated by COVID recovery. Issues highlighted at that time included stimulus created by government investment in infrastructure works, planning how to manage high demand for our services, high inflation in the short term, supply delays and difficulties, raw material shortages, lack of available labour, and cost pressures brought on by all the above.

The current business environment reflects both the general economic and larger federal and national business cycles. The issues overlap with the role of an industry association like the RIAA, namely to protect road and road worker safety, ensure ever increasing standards, and ensure we advocate on behalf of industry.

A significant factor in the current business environment is the level of investment by State Road Authorities in works and maintenance, as the tight economic cycle impacts their budgets and consequently workloads. National harmonisation is and will remain an ongoing challenge as we deal with the realities of our Federation and the state jurisdictions. Aligning specifications with accreditation frameworks while meeting all needs remains a challenge.

With safety paramount, Traffic Management and steps towards a national training framework are positive.

Labour issues around worker shortages and increasing labour cost pressures regarding Traffic Management overflow into road markings work and Civil Construction generally, at times conflicting with longer term contractual arrangements that are in place between industry and State Road Authorities.

It has been gratifying to work closely with the Traffic Management Association of Australia (TMAA) and the Civil Contractors Federation (CCF) as we represent our members and seek to deliver equitable outcomes.

The ability to source skilled and experienced labour remains an ongoing issue.

Against that backdrop of issues, we come together here in Cairns. Historically RIAA National Conferences have been held in the arc between the major population centres from South-Eastern Queensland through to Victoria. Cairns brings a fresh look and feel to the RIAA's premium event.

In addition to our Conference program, the RIAA Awards program will be delivered, culminating of course in the SARAH Award, for the outstanding contribution to our industry as nominated and decided by industry. The growing prestige and interest in around the RIAA Awards program will ensure that is a highlight of the RIAA National Conference Cairns 2024.

We welcome delegates and all attendee's to the joys of tropical North Queensland, and the professional and business development opportunities created by the RIAA National Conference. We wish all attendee's every success.

Every Road Worker has the Right to #GetHomeSafe

In May 2012, Safer Australian Roads and Highways (SARAH) conducted an event in New South Wales that they called Road Safety Week. By May the following year, the initiative had expanded to include Queensland, marking the beginning of what would become one of our country's most important events... Australia's National Road Safety Week.

The following article by SARAH President and Founder, Peter Frazer OAM, provides insight into the origins of the Week, its importance as Australia's foremost road safety event, and the critical focus on protecting those who work on our roads and highways.

Why actively protecting our road workers is so important to me.

Our road markers, traffic controllers, and indeed, all road workers, play an essential role in maintaining and improving our infrastructure, as well as actively looking after the community, yet they often face life-threatening risks while performing their critical duties. In addition to this, they have to struggle with what has become a general sense of road safety apathy in our community, for they have to contend with speeding drivers and riders, people who illegally use their phone while travelling through their work zone or even worse, facing abuse or even threats, simply because they are doing their job!

And sometimes they don't get home, leaving their loved ones to grieve for the rest of their lives.

We must never forget that behind every statistic is a person who always had a right to #GetHomeSafe. But the priority given to those who are vulnerable on our roads and highways has definitely declined... And over the past few years, there has been a reluctance by governments to be more active in the policy, compliance and law enforcement space.

While all Australian governments have agreed to implement policies that reduce road deaths from the 2020 figure of 1,160 to no more than 580 by 2030, the reality is that we are going in the wrong direction. For instance, if we were on target, by the end of May this year, Australia should have had a twelve-month rolling total of no more than 950 lives lost. However, we are nowhere near this mark, and indeed the level of road trauma across our country has substantially increased.

According to the Bureau of Infrastructure and Transport Research Economic (BITRE), there was a significant rise of over 10 percent in road deaths from June 1, 2023, to May 31, 2024. During this period, more than 1,300 people lost their lives on Australian roads, up from 1,180 for the same period the previous year.

But I don't just look at the rolling averages, or the year-onyear figures, because even these statistics tend to sanitise the true tragedy of road trauma. You see, since I got brought into this space in 2012, unbelievably, more than 14,000 Australian have been killed in road crashes, and more than 500,000 Australians have sustained serious injuries. This is a true pandemic.

And the reality behind these numbers is that some of our road workers have been victims, directly affected by death or serious injury.

It is therefore incumbent upon us to come together as an industry, challenge our politicians to do better, and actively support those trying to make a positive difference.

Why making a difference is important to me

My involvement in the road safety space began in February 2012 when my beautiful, intelligent, fun-loving daughter, Sarah Frazer, was killed by a distracted truck driver. She was only 23 years old. Losing a loved one is incredibly hard, but recognizing that Sarah's death was completely avoidable fundamentally changed who I am. We knew we had to raise awareness and influence our politicians and community.

Last February, my family commemorated the 12th anniversary of Sarah's death. She would have been 35 now, undoubtedly making a difference in the lives of others. She remains my inspiration, which is why we created Safer Australian Roads and Highways (SARAH), also known as Sarah Group after the name of our website.

We have been fortunate to make a difference by influencing the introduction of Slow Down Move Over (SloMo) and other laws, creating the yellow ribbon as SARAH's road safety symbol, now recognized nationally, and launching Australia's National Road Safety Week in 2013. As Sarah was killed while a tow truck driver was assisting her, our work has focused on safeguarding not only vulnerable drivers and riders but also all those whose workplace is the road. Sarah's death in an unplanned work zone underscored the need for this focus.

First as a family, and then as a small non-government organization, we fought tirelessly to get a law introduced that required vehicles to slow down when passing police, emergency services, roadside assistance, or tow-truck vehicles with flashing lights. It took many years to get the New South Wales Government to act... but eventually they did act, and in October 2019 the SloMo law was introduced... it was dubbed "Sarah's Law".

I am very proud that similar laws are now in most Australian jurisdictions, but our work hasn't ceased on this issue, for these laws need to be more comprehensive, and include the protection of every road worker. Simply put, we want drivers and riders to slow down and give those working in planned and temporary work zones, the space they need to be safe.

Because our primary motivation remains those who are vulnerable on our roads and highways, I am passionate about getting our community to actively protect line markers, traffic controllers, and every road worker so that they get home safe to their loved ones... every day... no exceptions.

I am proud of our contribution to road safety and especially proud that the lives of our road markers and traffic controllers are now firmly on the national agenda. We use every mechanism to reinforce this including the event we created... National Road Safety Week!

National Road Safety Week 2024

The key strength of National Road Safety Week lies in its ability to foster collaboration between various stakeholders and to utilize the yellow ribbon as the shared national symbol. While all jurisdictions are involved, this year, Tasmania hosted the National Launch. I want to give a shout-out to Deputy Premier Hon Michael Ferguson MP, who was a fantastic advocate for bringing the focus of the Week to his state. I also extend my gratitude to Hon Eric Abetz MP, Minister for Transport, as well as the Tasmanian Department of State Growth for their fantastic support and partnership. Importantly, the protection of our road workers is very much on the Tasmanian Government's agenda.

National Road Safety Week needs community involvement to be successful and the importance of wide collective action is crucial. Our collaboration with industry has been vital and getting them to display yellow ribbon stickers or fly yellow ribbons on vehicles means they are turning their cars and trucks into moving billboards for road safety.

So to spread the message, we have forged relationships with a wide variety of partners across every jurisdiction, including law enforcement, councils, road marking, traffic management, mining, trucking and logistics, road safety organizations, community groups, and community leaders and influencers. These collaborations have led to the development and implementation of innovative programs, campaigns, and policies that have positively impacted road safety across Australia, especially with regard to the effects of unsafe driving practices on those on the road ahead.

It is clear that by working with industry and other stakeholders, that the Week has been instrumental in raising public awareness, encouraging responsible behaviours, and perhaps even inspiring individuals to talk with their friends, family and colleagues about the importance of prioritizing road safety.

Keeping our Eyes on the Prize - It's all about working together

So National Road Safety Week has become an incredible collaboration by those who want to make a difference... and they are making a difference! Some of this year's major initiatives and activities included:

- » 2024 National Road Safety Week Statement by His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia
- » Lighting iconic structures, bridges, and buildings in yellow, promoting them as road safety icons.
- » Conducting NRSW launches and events, issuing media statements, providing Community Service Announcements (CSAs on television and radio), and using social media to promote community engagement.
- » Attaching yellow ribbons to government and corporate fleets (e.g., police, emergency services, line markers, traffic control, roadside assistance, logistics, tow trucks etc) as well as private vehicles to demonstrate their commitment to "Drive So Others Survive" by actively protecting vulnerable road users and standing in solidarity with victims of road trauma.
- » Parliamentarians issuing public/media statements, wearing yellow lapel ribbons, attaching ribbons to their vehicles, and leading the community in signing the Road Safety Pledge.

A Thank You from SARAH

I may have been brought into this space through the most tragic of circumstances, and my heart will be forever broken in losing my daughter, but I am grateful for the relationships that we have formed, the industry partnerships that now exist, and the changes, that together we have influenced. I am also indebted to RIAA for honouring our road safety work through the creation of the annual Sarah Frazer Award that acknowledges one of your pre-eminent industry leaders. And importantly, our sincere thanks to the many RIAA members that support our work because the continued road safety success of SARAH will always be dependent upon our shared actions. As such, we will very much look forward to our future involvement with you.

And lastly, as our preparations for next year's National Road Safety Week have already begun, here's our commitment to you...

SARAH will always do all we can to protect our road workers so everyone can



THE RIAA NATIONAL CONFERENCE

The RIAA Welcomes you to our two venues for the 2024 RIAA National Conference; the Shangri-La by the Marina Cairns, and the Grand Ballroom at The Pullman.

Theres a peculiar sort of confusion that descends when selecting a venue for an event as important to an Association as the Conference is to the RIAA.

The feeling reminds me of when I was very young and twisted my late Dad's arm to take me to the cricket at the MCG. This was in the days before allocated seating, and it was literally a case of "first in, best dressed". My boyish enthusiasm dictated that Dad had to do everything possible to make sure we were one of, if not the first, people through the gates.

But that's where the confusion set in. Dad let me pull the reins and once inside we were confronted with 100,000 empty seats. And I could never decide which one I wanted. Near the boundary? To try for a catch, or maybe get a high five from Thommo or Lillee down at fine leg? Behind the bowlers' arm so we could assess the action as technically as possible? Higher up so we could monitor the field placings?

That same sense of opportunity, options, and confusion seeps out from my bone marrow when discussion turns to the next RIAA Conference venue. From literally a blank piece of paper, one then considers the entirety of the vast Australian Continent, before establishing a preferred destination for the event.

RIAA Directors took the bold step of bringing the RIAA National Conference to tropical North Queensland and Cairns.

Relief! A decision, a venue..... not so fast!! Quite obviously, Cairns is built around tourism and tourist attractions, which is a great thing for Conference delegates. But that brings its own version of "empty MCG confusion", as there were literally multiple venues that could have done a wonderful job in hosting the RIAA National Conference.

At this point, I give enormous thanks to Natalie and the team at Tourism Tropical North Queensland (TTNQ), who welcomed our briefing and developed an itinerary and inspections of suitable venues. Please take time to say hello to Natalie and the TTNQ team who will be visible at our Conference. The TTNQ team was also instrumental in forging connections to various local businesses who have each played their part in organising this National Conference.

Ultimately our Conference comes to the Shangri-La in Cairns for the main Conference sessions, with the Thursday night Gala Dinner being held at the Pullman Grand Ballroom.

Key considerations in selecting these sites included the quality, infrastructure, scale of the venues, and general synergy with the RIAA. To some extent, the Shangri-La reminds me of the Opal Cove in Coffs Harbour (for those who were there), in the sense that it has a natural match between its facilities and the format of our event, namely the presentation sessions, Exhibition space, accommodation, and break area's all being self-contained.

The Grand Ballroom at the Pullman is a spectacular setting for our Gala Dinner. Again, a scale and setting that will work with our Conference and provide a fantastic and fitting atmosphere for this type of event.

Industry Associations engage in many functions to enhance the well-being of the industry they represent. Those many functions often include networking, providing business development opportunities, updating the latest issues, and unveiling new and emerging trends.

The RIAA National Conference ticks all those boxes. But more than that, the opportunity for renewing old friendships, acquaintances, and even rivalries. This Conference combines those themes with a wonderful location and two great venues. The opportunity for a professionally and personally rewarding time is self-evident.

Explore Cairns

Cairns is the gateway to the Great Barrier Reef, offering adventures above and below the Coral Sea blue, and is the perfect base to explore Tropical North Queensland's world-famous rainforests.

Five reasons to visit Cairns

A special place where rainforest meets reef, the tropical Far North sun warms winter, green season rains make waterfalls rumble, and the people here first tell Dreamtime stories. It's the spot to escape the ordinary and a destination that makes magical holiday memories lasting a lifetime.

Get on the GBR

Shangri-La The Marina, Cairns sits steps from Reef Fleet Terminal making it a cinch to explore the reef. NSW road toll remains below pre-COVID average

In 2022, NSW recorded it's third-lowest road toll since 1923, a year that saw extreme wet weather events and increased travel following the easing of COVID restrictions. 288 people lost their lives on NSW roads and another 4,418 were seriously injured (hospitalised) during the first two quarters of 2022. This road toll remains below the 2017–19 pre-COVID average of 363 deaths a year — but is an increase from the historic low of 275 recorded in 2021.

Keynote speakers



Jonathon Thurston

Johnathan Thurston AM is one of the greatest rugby league players of all time and a passionate advocate for Indigenous rights and empowerment.

As a player, Johnathan showcased exceptional skills and leadership, earning him numerous accolades, including four Dally M Medals, three Golden Boots, and a Clive Churchill Medal. He won the 2004 and 2015 NRL Premierships, represented Queensland in State of Origin on 37 occasions and donned the green and gold jersey for the Australian national team in 37 Tests.

Beyond his on-field achievements, Johnathan has been a tireless advocate for the Indigenous community. He has used his platform to raise awareness about issues affecting Indigenous Australians and has actively campaigned for equality, education, and improved opportunities for young Indigenous people.

Johnathan has established various initiatives, including the JT Academy, which provides educational and leadership programs for Indigenous youth. He has also served as an ambassador for numerous Indigenous organisations, using his influence to drive positive change and inspire future generations. In 2017, Johnathan helped launch the \$9.5 million NRL Cowboys House, a home away from home for over 100 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from remote North Queensland.

Today, Johnathan continues to make a significant impact as a commentator, mentor, and ambassador, leaving an indelible legacy both on and off the field.




Professor Richard Hopkins

Richard Hopkins, a seasoned Formula One veteran with nearly three decades in the sport, began his F1 journey at 16 in 1987.

Notably, he served as Head of Operations for Red Bull's F1 Team, instrumental in transforming them into consecutive World Championship winners.

Relocating from the UK to Australia in 2016, Richard now holds the position of Professor of Practice at UNSW Sydney, leading the groundbreaking Sunswift Racing prototype EV project, setting Guinness World Records for long-range electric vehicles.

Additionally, he serves as the High Performance Adviser for Walkinshaw Andretti United's Australian Supercar team, nurturing young racing talent through the Foundation Academy.



Sarah Murray

Sarah Murray has been a pioneer in the meta-verse space since 2017. Her leadership on the topic lead to the first application of computer games and virtual technology for social impact affordable housing in the United Kingdom, United States and early work in Australia.




Jayden Hladio

This involved consultation with Austroads, the Department of Transport and Planning (Vic) and Industry. By mid-March 2024, COVE began offering this fully-updated training, focusing on TC1 and TMI1. Additionally, COVE provides RPL to help existing workers maintain their qualifications. Under Helen's leadership, COVE Training stands as a leading provider of these new skill sets in Victoria.



Matthew Bereni


